Causes of Homelessness




- Lack of Affordable Housing
- Poverty
 - Under-employment
- Health Problems/Medical Bills
- Domestic Violence
- Natural and Other Disasters
- Abuse/Neglect (unaccompanied youth)



Homelessness Impacts Education





Impacts

- **Standardized Test Scores** (math & reading)
- **SPED Needs**
- **School Drop Out**
- **Grade Retention**

Homelessness Creates Barriers



Students experiencing homelessness may

- Not be able to meet enrollment requirements/documents
- Lack stability with frequent moves
- Experience hunger, fatigue, and stress
- Not have school supplies or a quiet place to study
- Not have access to reliable transportation
- Not have a parent or guardian to help them (unaccompanied youth).



National Statistics on Homelessness





1 in 30

adolescent minors ages 13 to 17 endures some form of homelessness in a year. A quarter of the prevalence involves couch surfing only.




Youth with less than a high school diploma or GED had a 346% higher risk of homelessness

Idaho Student Data

- 318,979 students as of 6/2023 (non-weighted/duplicated)
- 9,144 students identified as homeless SY22-23
- 3% students identified homeless
- 39% state low income rate (lunch eligibility) data)

National trend is 10% of students who qualify for free/reduced lunch may be experiencing homelessness.

McKinney What?



McKinney-Vento Homeless Act

42 U.S.C. § 11431

A federal law that addresses educational barriers and challenges created by homelessness by guaranteeing these students the right to:

- FAPE free appropriate public education
- Immediate *enrollment in school without traditional documents *enrollment defined as "attending classes and participating fully in school activities"
- Transportation to school of origin, if requested
- Educational supports/services needed for school success
- SPED services/supports, if eligible for SPED

Goals of the McKinney-Vento Act



Improve: Enrollment Retention, Successful **High School Completion**


Remove Barriers: Attendance, Credit Accrual, Extra-Curricular Participation

Support Transitions: Pre-K School and School-College/Career

Definition of "Homeless Children and Youth"



Individuals who lack a nighttime residence that is:

- Fixed Stationary, permanent, not subject to change
- Regular Predictable, routine. consistent
- Adequate Lawfully and reasonably sufficient



Includes Living Situations



- Sharing the housing of other persons (doubled-up) due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations



Living in emergency or transitional shelters

[42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2)]

Living Situations - continued





- Living in a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings

[42 U.S.C. § 11434a(2)]

Special Situations



- Migratory Children living in these circumstances (doubledup, motel, car, shelters, etc.)
- Unaccompanied Youth any youth who is not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian **AND** living situation qualifies as homeless

[42 U.S.C. § 11434a(6)]




MV/Homeless Education - Basic Program



• All public school districts (regardless of receiving federal program funding or not) need to meet the basic educational requirements of the McKinney Vento Act - reauthorized through ESSA, Title IX-A Section

Districts must ensure that:

- MV Liaison is named
- Students are identified
- Rights are met
- Services are provided & barriers are removed
- Student success & well-being is monitored
- Data is reported

Responsibility to Identify



Local liaison has the authority and responsibility to ensure that eligible students are identified.

Collaborative Effort

- School personnel All staff who interface with students/families are trained, aware of signs of homelessness, and referral process
- Outreach/coordination activities for self-identification

Step 1 – Identification/Outreach Measures



- Housing Survey
- Enrollment Staff Referral
- Teacher/Staff Referral
- Self-Referral/Community Awareness Free parent packets and posters available at https://nchehelpline.org/pages/free-orders.
- Other Types of Mid-year Outreach During parentteacher conferences

Step 2 - Verify Eligibility & Determine Needs



- Conduct follow-up evaluation to determine eligibility Sample form: McKinney-Vento Eligibility Evaluation Form
- Determine & arrange supports needed (transportation, food, enrollment documents, referrals, etc.)

Step 3 - Notify

- Do you have a cross referral system in place to increase identification?
