PLENARY II:

Indigenous Knowledge, Shoshone-Bannock Teachings, and Newe Daigwape

Keynote Speaker: Dr. Sammy Matsaw

Description:

The White House formally recognizing Indigenous Knowledge has come to the forefront of American society in the 21st Century, although it has predicated much of European settlement of the land. Land pedagogy is a 'new' ongoing context for how knowledge specific to tribal nations are being developed in both and models utilized to more favorable and adaptable ways of educating our children. Dr. Matsaw will speak to how Land Pedagogy overlaps with Tribal Ecology, with one informing the other towards what it means to learn from the land and waterways.

Specific to place is learning from the land that shapes behavior, and behavior shaping DNA to the traits that make up distinct tribal nations for example: Shoshone-Bannock teachings from Ishape and his fish basket. In ecology, the coming to know process mimics much of the learning that needs and does occur within and across family units in complex and dynamic learning ecosystem environments e.g. Newe daigwape.

Reclaiming how Public K-12 Indigenous Students are Counted: Implications for Tribal Sovereignty and School Districts

Description:

K-12 Indigenous students are chronically undercounted, which contributes to inequities in the quality of educational supports and services they are eligible for in public school districts. This session presents what a more equitable, maximum count of Native students looks like across the 50 states, including Idaho, and its implications for Tribal sovereignty and consultation.

Tribal nations, and Indigenous women specifically, have relationships and responsibilities that we hold to/with water in all its forms to achieve ethical social/moral relations to land, water and more-than-human relatives. Applying frameworks of hydro-social cycles and hydro-social territories at the intersection of Indigenous and critical water geographies offers a responsible approach to characterize Northern Cheyenne water governance at multiple scales.

Supporting Educator Growth Through the Evaluation Process and Alignment to the Nez Perce Cultural Standards

Description:

This session will focus on supporting educator growth through the evaluation process and alignment to the Nez Perce Cultural Standards. The educator evaluation process exists to facilitate the improvement of instruction. The State Framework for Teaching Evaluation is used to identify performance strengths and areas for improvement. This information is communicated to the educator and the educator is supported through an Individualized Professional Learning Plan (IPLP). The IPLP includes interventions based on the educator's strengths and areas of needed growth, how the educator will set student achievement growth goals, areas of identified professional development, mentoring that targets continuous improvement in professional areas, future student achievement, and school building or district culture. The Nez Perce Cultural Standards were created to identify the unique educational and cultural needs of students in the Nez Perce State Tribe. These standards were aligned to the Idaho Student Content Standards and the State Framework for Teaching Evaluation to show commonalities and improve educational outcomes.


