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Ongoing Challenges

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Recruitment and Retention of Special Education Teachers and Speech/Language Pathologists

Next to the inadequacy of funding, both at the federal and state levels, the on-going challenge that districts face in the recruitment and retention of speech/language pathologists and special education teachers as well as other qualified special education personnel is one of the main obstacles to meeting the needs of students with disabilities. Lack of funding for competitive pay, along with inadequate programs of preparation at the state's universities ensure that special education positions will continue to be the most difficult to fill. School districts that are unable to fill vacancies with certified educators must seek approval from the SDE to hire candidates who do not meet the state's standards. Candidates who do not meet the standards for special education and related services positions are being hired under letters of authorization or as consultant specialists.

In response to the Special Education personnel shortages, in 2016 the Special Education Director, Dr. Charlie Silva offered a hard to fill positions mini grant opportunity for the upcoming 2016-2017 school year in the amount of \$197,740 of available Federal IDEA Part B funds.

The Special Education department received over 56 applications and requests totaling in excess of \$700,000 for recruitment, retention, and or education stipends. Three independent scorers reviewed the grant award requests, whereas \$197,740 total dollars was subsequently awarded.

There clearly is an expressed need in the state of Idaho for both recruitment and retention of Special Education staff and related services. Education and certification stipends are one way the LEA's are being creative in recruiting from their existing staff member pool to fill these positions.

The next table represents the exact dollars and breakdown and what the award would be used for:

- 42% of the funds were to be used for recruiting stipends to attract Special Education Teachers and related services providers to the LEA school.
- 31% was requested for internal recruitment and to meet the education certification needs of the staff. Under this stipend, the LEA's were using the funds for recruiting

internally and or paying for needed certifications of the staff for these hard to fill positions.

- 28% was to offer retention stipends to keep existing staff and or service program providers at the local LEA.

The statewide personnel shortages create additional hardships especially for small Rural LEA's. These small LEA's are often unable to attract and compete with other larger districts in the state of Idaho, who may have the ability to offer considerable more pay. This *Hard- To-Fill-Positions* mini grant award was offered in a means to provide the assistance to bridge that gap.

Out of the 34 LEA's receiving the award 32 were considered small, rural or low income. Two LEAS', who were not in any of these categories, expressed an unfair recruitment advantage due to close proximity of larger neighboring districts and or neighboring states.

The Federal funds awarded for this purposes met less than 29% of the need in the State, as we awarded 22 partial awards and only 12 full award requests. The remaining 71% of the LEA's who did not receive the award continue their struggle to meet the personnel shortage. Because of the personnel shortage statewide, the Lea's often compete with each other, creating what is sometimes maybe considered an unfair advantage. The purpose of this award was to help create a more even playing field.

We are currently monitoring and tracking how these funds have allowed this small percentage of LEA's to recruit, and retain staff using the funds. We hope to share these results in a follow up report, in the near future.

Unfortunately, due to lack of federal funds, there is not a guarantee that the State Department of Education Special Education Division may be able to continue to commit to providing this funding on an on-going basis; therefore this most likely is a short term solution for many of our small, rural, low income districts.

We do however, believe this is one of the most important issue that is facing all of public education today, and in part it is due to the fact that funding for both State and Federal Special Education programs has continued to provide marginal support and is not increasing at the rate of costs for programs or services in the state.

Idaho's State special education funding formula has not been revised in nearly 20 years, and clearly does not reflect today's state public special educations growing needs, demands, and costs. The Federal funding for Special Education similarly has not met the financial funding demands. Both State and Federal funding are increasing at a rate less than 1% a year, while inflationary costs for providing Special Education are increasing between 7-9% in a given year. In 2015, state and local discretionary are showing a combined annual growth rate of 7.5% each year and Medicaid at 8%. Therefore, the special education program funding needs are being supplemented by discretionary dollars and other local funds, such as levies.

The State Department of Education, Special Education Division would request that the Idaho State Legislature review and update the Special Education funding formula under IDAPA Rule 08.02.01.400 to align to current numbers and averages¹, and allow for an increase the funding for state support for Special Education Funding for Districts . Additionally, the State Department of Education, Special Education Division, would request that the Idaho State Legislature review the personnel shortage for special education teachers and support personnel, provide complimentary solutions to address this serious problem.

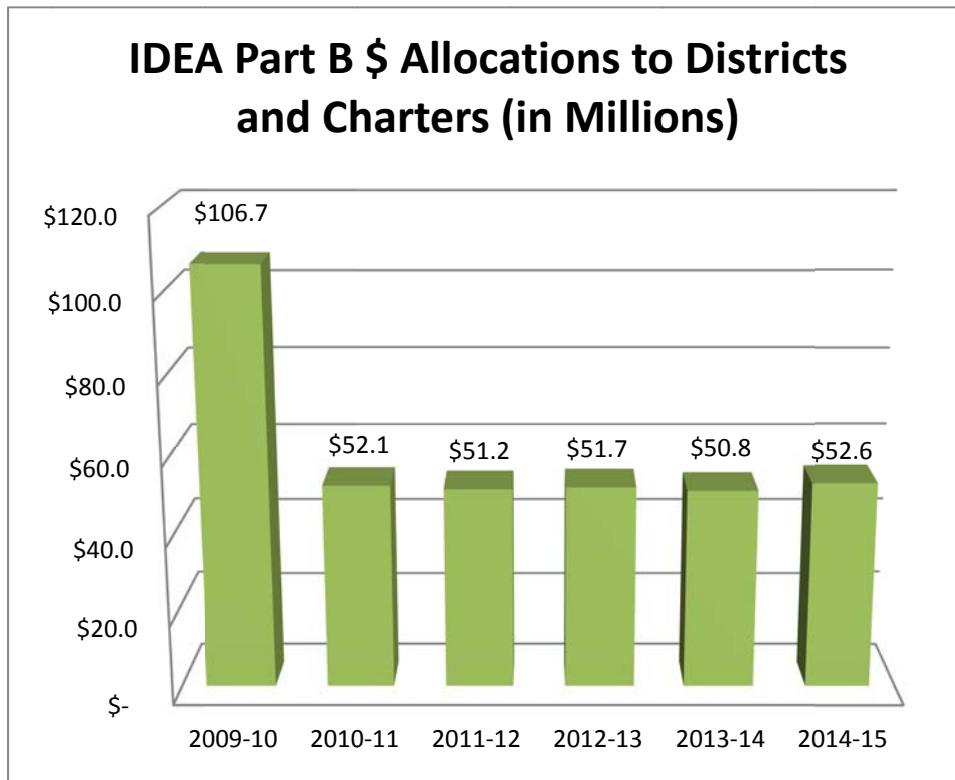
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Special Education Funding

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Federal IDEA Part B and Preschool Funding

Federal funds provided for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) are intended to assist states in providing special education and related services to students with disabilities so all students with disabilities have access to a free appropriate public education (FAPE). Two separate federal grants are authorized under IDEA Part B: Section 611 Grants to States (School Age) for students ages 3-21 and the Section 619 Preschool grant for students ages 3-5. All states receive IDEA Part B grants based on a federal formula and are required to provide allocations of those funds according to a formula described in IDEA.



Note: The increase in funding in school year 2009-10 includes additional federal funds distributed under ARRA.

The tables below outline how both IDEA grants were distributed in School Years 2015-16 and 2016-17.

The SDE's goal has always been to distribute significantly more of these funds to school districts and LEAs than is required by the funding formula. The allocations of flow-through funds to individual school districts and charter school LEAs are shown in Appendix B. Funds for State Administration are used to support the activities of the SDE Division of Special Education. Funds retained for State Level Activities are used for wide technical assistance and support activities, as well as direct support services for LEAs, many of which are provided by agreements with other agencies, such as institutions of higher learning.

2016-2017 Unexpected Award Distribution Changes

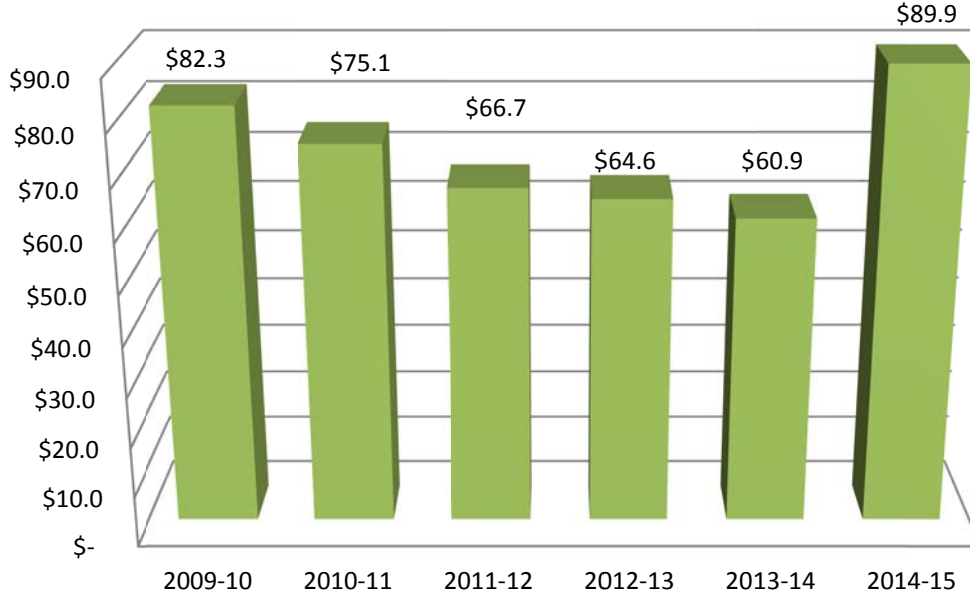
Distribution Changes due to Congress passing the Continuing Appropriations and Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriation Act, 2017, and Zika Response and Preparedness Act, a short-term continuing resolution that provides funding for a number of Federal programs through December 9, 2016. The bill included an across-the-board reduction of .0496 percent that affects the advance portion of fiscal year 2016 award for four major Department of Education programs that become available on October 1, 2016. Consequently, the allocations for these programs – Title I LEA grants, Title II State Grants, Career Technical Education State Grants, and IDEA Part B Grants to States were slightly reduced.

The table below illustrates how the SDE intends to make the budgetary adjustments:

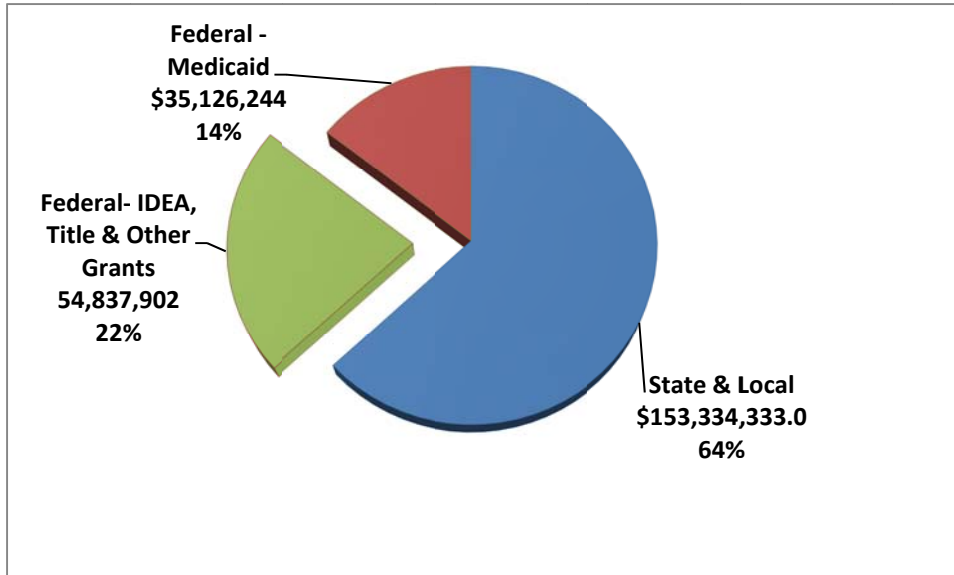

All Federal Expenditures including IDEA Part B & Medicaid \$ for Special Education Programs & Services (in Millions)

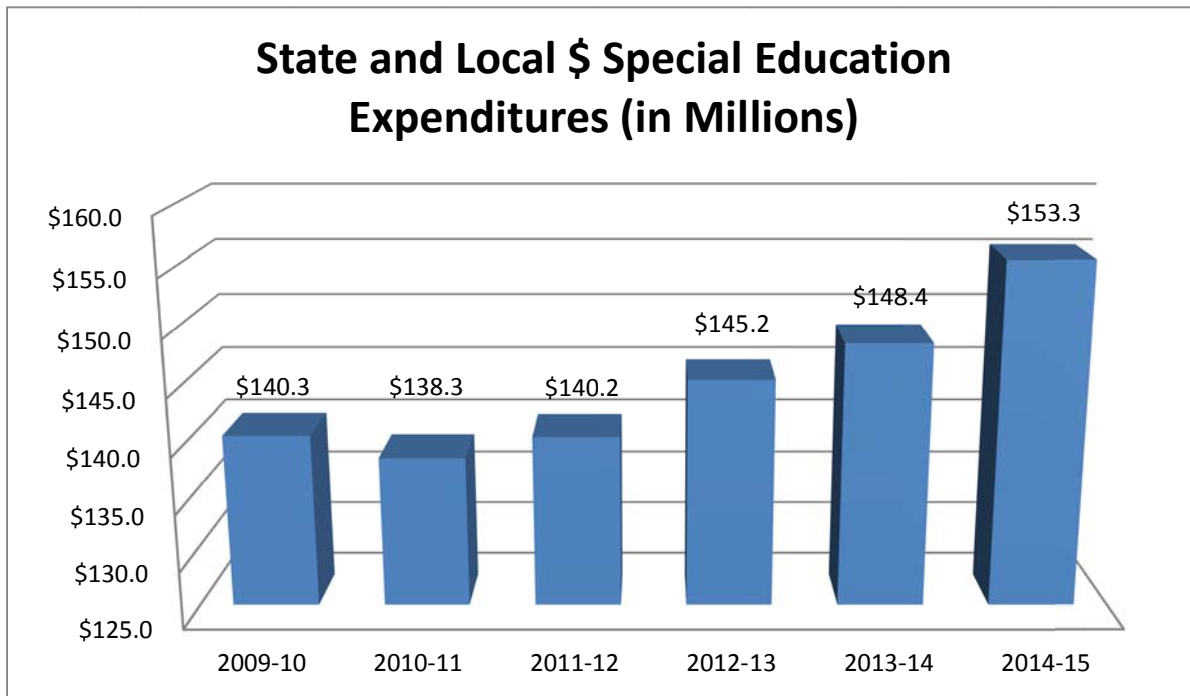

Appendix A

2014-2015 State and Local Special Education Funding by District

The table in Appendix A reports special education revenue and expenditure information for each school district and charter school for 2014-2015. Columns A-F of the table includes the following:

Column A – Pro-Rata Share of State Support and Benefits

Column A includes state entitlement and base support funds pro-rated in accordance with the proportion of units generated by special education. Per Idaho Code § 33-1002, exceptional child support units are computed with a divisor of 14.5. An exceptional child support unit provides districts the same amount of funding as a regular education unit, but it generally takes fewer students to generate a special education unit. However, when applicable, a lower general education secondary divisor less than 14.5 was used to calculate secondary special education funding in Appendix A. Column A represents the pro-rata share of state support units based on the first reporting period (now referred to as midterm reporting).

IDAPA Rule 08.02.01.400 Special Education Funding for District with Approved Programs, governs the state reimbursement provision for exceptional child support units, and is based on the following formula: Preschool students will generate funding based upon the weekly hours and minutes they are enrolled in special education. For the remaining student population, district and charter schools receive support unit funding for special education students based on a rate of 6.1 percent of a school's total elementary (K-6) enrollment and 5.5 percent of a district's total secondary (7-12) enrollment.

Schools receive funds at these percentages regardless of the actual percentage of special education students in the school. The percentage of special education students enrolled in K-12 public schools in Idaho for the 2014-15 school year was an average of 10 percent. Refer to Appendix B for enrollment and Special Education percentages by District/LEA.

Pursuant to Idaho Code §§ 33-1002 and 33-1004, staff allocation funding is available to support all school programs. This funding is based on the total number of support units generated by a school's general education, special education, and alternative school programs. For each support unit, schools qualify for reimbursement for 1.1 teachers, .075 administrators, and .375 classified staff. This reimbursement is subject to a statewide salary index that recognizes education and experience. The total dollars allocated to a school for staff allocation funding are referred to as base support. Basic benefits (unemployment, social security, and retirement) are also paid by the state.

Column B - Pro-Rata Share of Exceptional Allocation of Discretionary Funding

Column B includes pro rata share of the Exceptional Allocation based on the best 28 weeks support units, multiplied by the 2014-2015 state distribution factor of \$22,401 and using the 14.5 unit divisor as defined by Idaho Code 33-1002 and applying IDAPA Rule 08-02.400.02

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as identified in Column A applies; however Column B represents the pro-rata share of state support units based using the best 28 weeks exceptional units multiplied by \$22,401 discretionary distribution factor established by the Legislature each educational budget year.

Column C – *Special Distributions*

Column C includes special distributions for contracts with private agencies (I.C. § 33-2004 & IDAPA 08.02.400.02), special education tuition equivalency funding (I.C. § 33-1002B(3)), and funding for students with emotional disturbance (I.C. § 33-2005).

Schools may claim reimbursement for a portion of the costs of approved contracts with private agencies that meet state standards. Payment provides the same level of state support for contracted students as for students served in public school programs.

Schools that provide special education for students whose parents reside in other Idaho school districts may claim reimbursement for local tuition-equivalency allowances and also receive the exceptional child divisor for all such students. Additional funds are based on the receiving school's tuition rate and a state-calculated excess cost factor to assist these schools in meeting the needs of these students. This excess cost factor was \$7,784 per eligible student in the 2014-15 school year. There were 297 eligible students for a total distribution value of 2,311,845.

Schools that identify and serve high numbers of students with emotional disabilities receive additional state support to offset these costs.

Column D – *Type of Special Distribution*

This column identifies the type(s) of special distributions that are included in Column C.

Column E – *Pro Rata Share of State Funds*

Column E is the sum of columns A, B and C.

Column F – Total Special Education General Fund Expenditures Reported in IFARMS

Column F indicates the amount of state and local funds expended to provide special education and related services as reported by each school district and charter school via the Idaho Financial Accounting Reporting Management System (IFARMS) via Financial Reports submitted annually.

The figures reported on this worksheet show the most accurate data available at the time of this report.
