The district will not receive any additional state funding for the charter school.

Facility funding is different for charter schools. Charters are generally not included on/with district bonds and plant facility levies; this is often a hardship on new charters

More in-depth study is required.

Facility funding is different for charter schools. Charters are generally not included on/with district bonds and plant facility levies; this is often a hardship on new charters.

A clear authorizing relationship should be established between the board of the district and the board of the charter. Measurable criteria in the form of a performance certificate should be agreed upon.

Is a charter school the answer?

The process for writing a charter application is complicated and requires research, dedication, and a commitment to academic excellence.

An authorizer must approve the application.

There must be a clear need and interest in the community for such an educational program.
