


Get To Know Your Neighbors


Road Map Questionnaire


Site Seeing

1. What campus resources are you interested in learning more about?


2. What resources would be most important to you when selecting a college that you might want to attend?

Descriptions:

- This building contains lots of books but it also provides students with access to research assistance, technology, and many other services and resources.
- Most universities are made up of smaller "colleges". This building might house classrooms, labs, faculty offices, and advisors for a certain degree program.
- 3. Most campuses provide basic medical services, mental health resources, and health education for students. These resources might be located in which building?
- Potential students might go to this building to get help applying for college. College students might also visit this building for help with registering for classes or with questions about their financial aid or scholarships.
- 5. Many campuses have a gym, fitness classes, or other types of physical health activities for students. What building do you think these might be located in?
- 6. Students in college might have the option of living on or off campus. For students who live on campus, which building might their rooms be located in?
- 7. College campuses are always busy. Most campuses have clubs, social events, celebrations, awareness initiatives, and much more happening on a regular basis. Most of these events happen in this building, which might also house fun ntertainment options or places to purchasea meal or snack.




Get Into The Right Mindset




Pokestop Tour




